

Aviation Alphabet

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Communication and safety are important in aviation. The international Aviation Alphabet was created to help pilots and air traffic controllers understand each other. Each letter is tied to a word to identify aircraft and airport taxiways.

Using this phonetic alphabet is for optimal safety and avoids mistakes caused by familiar sounding letters. For example, the letters E and T and M and N can be mistaken for each other. Here is the Aviation Alphabet:

A – Alpha N – November

B – Bravo O – Oscar

C – Charlie P - Papa

D – Delta Q – Quebec

E – Echo R – Romeo

F – Foxtrot S – Sierra

G-Golf T-Tango

 $\mathsf{H}-\mathsf{Hotel} \\ \mathsf{U}-\mathsf{Uniform}$

I – India V – Victor

J – Juliet W - Whiskey

K - Kilo X - X-ray

L – Lima Y – Yankee

M - Mike Z - Zulu

Now, let's go through an example of how the Aviation Alphabet is used at an airport.

Airplane pilot with identifying tail number N1DC:

"Phoenix Tower, November One Delta Charlie ready for takeoff."

Phoenix Air Traffic Control:

"November One Delta Charlie taxi via taxiway Sierra and hold short Runway 8-26."
