

# 1. Title VI Policy Statement<sup>1</sup>

City of Phoenix Aviation Department assures that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, national origin (including limited English proficiency (LEP)), sex (including sexual orientation and gender identity), creed, or age, as provided by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 (PL 100.259), Section 520 of the Airport and Airway Improvement Act of 1982, and related authorities (hereafter, "Title VI and related requirements"), be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity that receives U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) funding. Title VI also prohibits retaliation for asserting or otherwise participating in claims of discrimination.

City of Phoenix Aviation Department further assures every effort will be made to ensure nondiscrimination in all of its programs and activities, whether those programs are federally funded or not including any programs or activities of our sub-recipients. The Airport Sponsor agrees, among other things, to understand the communities surrounding or in the flight path, as well as customers that use the airport. Anytime communities may be impacted by programs or activities the City of Phoenix Aviation Department will take action to involve them and the general public in the decision making process.

City of Phoenix Aviation Department requires nondiscrimination assurances, as prescribed by FAA, from each tenant, contractor, and concessionaire providing an activity, service, or facility at the airport. Assurances must be included in any related lease, contract, or franchise agreement between City of Phoenix Aviation Department and each tenant, contractor, and concessionaire, as well as in any similar agreements with their own sub-tenants and sub-contractors.

# Declaración de Política del Título VI<sup>1</sup>

El Departamento de Aviación del Municipio de Phoenix asegura que ninguna persona por motivos de raza, color, origen nacional (incluido el dominio limitado del inglés (LEP, por sus siglas en inglés), sexo (incluida la orientación sexual y la identidad de género), credo o edad, según lo dispuesto por el Título VI de la Ley de Derechos Civiles de 1964, la Ley de Restauración de Derechos Civiles de 1987 (PL 100.259), la Sección 520 de la Ley de Mejoramiento de Aeropuertos y Vías Aéreas de 1982, y las autoridades relacionadas (en adelante, "Título VI y requisitos relacionados"), esté excluida de participar en, ser negado los beneficios de, o ser sujeto de otra manera de discriminación bajo cualquier programa o actividad que reciba fondos del Departamento de Transporte de los EE. UU. (DOT, por sus siglas en inglés). El Título VI también prohíbe las represalias por afirmar o participar de otra manera en reclamos de discriminación.

El Departamento de Aviación del Municipio de Phoenix asegura además que se hará todo lo posible para garantizar la no discriminación en todos sus programas y actividades, ya sea que esos programas estén financiados por el gobierno federal o no incluidos los programas o actividades de nuestros subreceptores. El Aeropuerto Patrocinador se compromete, entre otras cosas, a comprender a las comunidades que rodean o en la ruta de vuelo, así como a los clientes que utilizan el aeropuerto. Cada vez que las comunidades puedan verse afectadas por programas o actividades, el Departamento de Aviación del Municipio de Phoenix tomará medidas para involucrarlas a ellas y al público en general en el proceso de toma de decisiones.

El Departamento de Aviación del Municipio de Phoenix requiere garantías de no discriminación, según lo prescrito por la FAA, de cada inquilino, contratista y concesionario que proporciona una actividad, servicio o instalación en el aeropuerto. Las garantías deben incluirse en cualquier acuerdo de arrendamiento, contrato o franquicia relacionado entre el Departamento de Aviación del Municipio de Phoenix y cada arrendatario, contratista y concesionario, así como en cualquier acuerdo similar con sus propios subinquilinos y subcontratistas.

## 3. Grant and Procurement Assurances

City of Phoenix Aviation Department will complete standard grant assurances for Title VI and related requirements, in the form prescribed by FAA. #### Clauses/Covenants

- a. All contracts, leases, deeds, licenses, permits, and other similar instruments, must contain the contractual requirements and clauses, in the form prescribed by FAA. ### **Description of Oversight Methods for Subcontracts**

The following verbiage has been included in all Aviation Request for Proposals (RFPs) regarding contract monitoring:

"6.3 Monitoring. The Equal Opportunity Department shall monitor the employment policies and practices of suppliers and lessees subject to this Section 3 as deemed necessary. The Equal Opportunity Department is authorized to conduct on-site compliance reviews of selected firms, which may include an audit of personnel and payroll records, if necessary."

Monitoring of City of Phoenix Aviation Department subcontracts occurs as new contracts are finalized and upon renewal. The City of Phoenix Equal Opportunity Department, who leads the City's ACDBE and DBE programs, may also monitor as their discretion.

# 4. Title VI Coordinator Responsibilities

The Coordinator is responsible for ensuring that they and other staff supporting the Title VI are trained in Title VI requirements. Essential training topics include:

- Basic Title VI requirements
- Airport language assistance resources and practices
- Collecting and assessing demographic data
- Reporting Title VI complaints and other required FAA notifications.

See Training Section for more information for expected training for all staff.

Among other responsibilities, the Coordinator:

- Proactively ensures that the Airport Sponsor is in compliance with nondiscrimination requirements of Title VI and reports to City of Phoenix Aviation Department leadership on the status of Title VI compliances.
- Responds promptly to requests by FAA for data and records and for the scheduling of compliance reviews and other FAA meetings to determine compliance with Title VI and related requirements.
- Receives discrimination complaints covered by Title VI and related requirements, and forwards them to the FAA, within 15 days of receipt, together with any actions taken to resolve the matter.
- Provides the FAA with updates regarding its response and status of early resolution efforts to complaints concerning Title VI and related requirements (49 CFR Part 21, Appendix C(b)(3)), including resolution efforts.
- Annually reviews the airport's Title VI plan and disseminates information throughout staff and the Airport Sponsor's leadership.
- Coordinates data collection to evaluate whether racial or ethnic groups are unequally benefited or impacted by airport programs. The data will be regularly assessed and readily available upon request (49 CFR § 21.9(b) & (c)). Data collection methods will include optional demographic questions in: airport customer satisfaction surveys, customer complaints, airport event sign-in sheets, and bids/proposals for airport contracts, and other methods described in the airport Community Participation Plan (CPP).
- Maintains demographic data for members of appointed planning and advisory bodies for the airport. Identifies any disparities compared to the community. Provides information to the membership selecting official/committee, particularly when vacancies occur.
- Maintains a copy of 49 CFR Part 21 for inspection by any person asking for it during normal working hours (49 CFR 21, Appendix C (b)(2)(i)).

City of Phoenix Aviation Department will conspicuously display the FAA-provided Unlawful Discrimination Poster in all public areas on airport property, including those with pedestrian activity. #### Outreach to Affected Communities

The Public Relations Division of the City of Phoenix Aviation Department ensures that notices for public meetings reach all segments of the impacted community. The Title VI coordinator will identify the effective media platforms to share announcement and notices. Announcements are made in social media, general circulation newspapers, community newspapers, and email broadcast. The Title VI Coordinator contacts leaders and representatives in Affected Communities directly to confirm effective media platforms to reach all Affected Communities<sup>2</sup> and provide important feedback on translated materials. The office maintains records

of all such notices and the efforts made to reach each of the Affected Communities.

City of Phoenix Aviation Department will create a detailed CPP by June 30, 2023. A copy of the plan will be available at <u>skyharbor.com</u> and is available for public inspection at the City of Phoenix Aviation Department Headquarters, 2485 East Buckeye Road, Phoenix, Arizona 85034.

To ensure that the community is effectively informed of and able to participate in public hearings, the City of Phoenix includes public notices translated into appropriate languages, including for any language spoken by a significant number or proportion of the Affected Community population that has limited English proficiency (LEP). Such social media postings and notices will include direction for obtaining an interpreter, free of charge, for public hearings. 28 CFR § 42.405(d). See Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Section.

### **6. Community Statistics**

Title VI regulations require Federal grant recipients to know their community demographics. See 49 CFR § 21.9(b). By knowing this information, the City of Phoenix Aviation Department will be able to identify, understand, and engage with communities. # Low Income Communities<sup>2</sup>.

A low-income area is an identifiable group of persons living in geographic proximity, whose median household income is at or below the Department of Health and Human Services poverty guidelines. Pursuant to Executive Order 12898, "Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations," City of Phoenix Aviation Department is collecting information about affected and potentially affected low-income communities. According to the U.S. Census Report, [S1701: Poverty Status in the Past 12 Months, found at <a href="https://data.census.gov/cedsci/table?q=S1701">https://data.census.gov/cedsci/table?q=S1701</a>], the overall poverty level for the Phoenix-Mesa-Chandler, Arizona Metro Area is approximately 12.7%. The poverty rate of the affected communities remains high (13.6%) compared with the rest of the Phoenix-Mesa-Chandler Metro Area. The poverty rates for the specific Affected Communities are as follows:

#### <u>Limited English Proficiency (LEP)</u>.

The goal of all language access planning and implementation is to ensure that City of Phoenix Aviation Department communicates effectively with limited English proficient (LEP) individuals. Effective language access requires self-assessment and planning. The next table lists non-English languages<sup>1</sup> that are spoken in LEP households in the Affected Communities. The data source is American Community Survey, Table B16001 – Language Spoken at Home by Ability to Speak English for the Population 5 Years and Over.

The threshold we have used for identifying the languages with significant LEP populations is the DOT LEP Policy Guidance safe harbor threshold, which is 5% or 1,000, whichever is less.<sup>2</sup> The safe harbor for our communities is 1,000 people. #### Beneficiary Diversity.

Some information is collected from airport customers, attendees at community meetings, and businesses seeking opportunities at the airport, through voluntary disclosures.

### **Description of Beneficiary Demographic Information Collection Methods**

- PHX's Customer Service staff conducts surveys of airport guests for customer satisfaction with airport concessions, restroom cleanliness, food offerings, and other elements and services. The survey is conducted on at least an annual basis and will include voluntary disclosure of demographical information.
- PHX will gather beneficiary demographic information on a voluntary basis. Respondents to survey will include participants in contracting and procurement processes conducted by City of Phoenix Aviation staff. Additional respondents will include tenants (including sub-tenants), contractors (and any sub-contractors) of airports operated by the City of Phoenix Aviation Department. Required information regarding demographic has also been obtained by the Equal Opportunity Department through its certification and compliance efforts with our ACDEB and DBE programs. Information obtained through these means will not impact race and gender neutral business enterprise programs, but rather to ensure the beneficiary population impacted by airport operations.

### Staff and Advisory Board Diversity.

Demographic information is collected from airport program employees and members of planning and advisory boards, through voluntary disclosures.

# 7. Potential or Known Community Impacts

Projects or services receiving federal financial assistance have the potential to touch so many aspects of American life. #### **Description of Interpretation Assistance Processes**

- PHX's Customer Service team maintains a list of multilingual employees, the languages they speak, and their associated contact information. The list indicates whether each employee is proficient to provide interpretation and/or translation services. The list is updated as needed by Customer Service staff and provided to all airport employees. Generally, these employee volunteers are available to assist members of the public with verbal real-time interpretation, during normal business hours.
- The airport contracts with the Language Line, Inc. to provide on-demand telephone interpretation services to airport guests. When a request for an interpreter is received, the following process is used: Airport information desk staff use I-Speak cards or online resources (i.e. Google Translate, etc.) to identify the language spoken by the airport guest. Staff contacts Language Line, Inc. and "parks" the request in the queue for the appropriate language.
- Posted notices in Spanish about available language assistance in the information desks of the terminals.
- The PHX Navigators wear flag lapel pins representing the country of the language they speak.
- The Airport's website includes Spanish pages where vital travel information is provided, including ground transportation information, traveling to the airport, monetary exchange locations and maps of airport amenities. Translation into other languages is readily available through a Google Translate plug-in
- Information about the Airport's customer service agents with translating capabilities and the phone translation services are also posted on the Spanish page of the website.

# 11. Training

New employee orientation incorporates Title VI training. Topics include:

- Title VI and related laws prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin (including LEP), sex (including sexual orientation and gender identity), creed, or age
- Title VI complaints must be forwarded to the Coordinator
- Protections against retaliation for filing civil rights complaints or related actions
- Title VI notices must be displayed throughout the airport public facilities
- All contracts must include Title VI clauses
- Language interpretation and translation services
- Cultural and community relations sensitivity training
- Anti-harassment training

Refresher information will be provided annually.

# 12. Compliance Reviews, Audits, Complaints, Lawsuits, and Other Investigations

FAA Notification. The Coordinator will notify FAA of any pending investigations and reviews, including:

- Compliance reviews or audits concerning civil rights requirements<sup>13</sup>
- Complaints, lawsuits, or other investigations alleging noncompliance with civil rights requirements <sup>14</sup>

As discussed in the Title VI Complaints Section, Title VI complaints must be forwarded to FAA contacts within 15 days of receipt. For all other civil rights investigations, City of Phoenix Aviation Department must notify FAA contacts of any new investigations prior to grant execution.

At regular intervals, the Coordinator will provide FAA contacts with status updates for the investigations and reviews, until completed. For each existing investigation or review completed within 5 years of this plan, the Coordinator will also provide a statement about the outcome, unless previously provided.

13. Title VI Complaints
49 CFR 21.11; 49 CFR 21 Appendix C (b)(3); 28 CFR 42.406(d)

Scope. These procedures are for complaints of discrimination under Title VI and related laws (hereafter "Title VI Complaints." In order to be a Title VI Complaint, the complaint must:

1. Allege discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin (including LEP), sex (including sexual orientation and gender identity), creed, or age or violations administrative requirements under Title VI or related laws.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>14</sup> Includes allegations of discrimination based on race, color, national origin (including LEP), sex (including sexual orientation and gender identity), creed, or age, whether because of actions of the airport sponsor itself, or its employees, contractors, or tenants. Includes noncompliance with related administrative requirements under civil rights laws.

- 2. Not only be for employment matters<sup>15</sup>
- 3. Allege misconduct by the City of Phoenix Aviation Department or its sub-recipients, including airport employees, contractors, concessionaires, lessees, or tenants.
- 4. Concern an airport facility or actions by the City of Phoenix Aviation Department including airport employees, contractors, concessionaires, lessees, or tenants.

<u>Rights</u>. Any person who believes that he or she has been subjected to discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin (including LEP), sex (including sexual orientation and gender identity), creed, or age has the right to file a complaint with the City of Phoenix Aviation Department. Alternatively, they can file a formal complaint with an outside agency, such as the U.S. Departments of Justice or Transportation, or the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), or seek other legal remedies.

<u>Receipt of Complaint</u>. The Coordinator will log in the complaint and promptly send copies of the complaint to City of Phoenix Equal Opportunity and any relevant internal stakeholders for the complaint.

Complaints must be filed within 180 days of the discriminatory event, must be in writing, and must be delivered to:

If a complaint is initially made by phone, it must be supplemented with a written complaint before 180 days after the discriminatory event has passed. If a verbal complaint is received, the complainant should be given a copy of the Airport Discrimination Complaint Procedures and instructed to submit a written complaint. Accommodation will be provided upon request to individuals unable to file a written complaint due to a disability.

<u>Initial Procedure.</u> The Coordinator may meet with the complainant to clarify the issues, obtain additional information, and determine if informal resolution might be possible in lieu of an investigation. If successfully resolved, the Coordinator will issue a closure letter to the complainant, record the disposition in the complaints log, and report the resolution to FAA.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>15</sup> Complaints of employment discrimination must be addressed as required by EEOC and other applicable authorities with jurisdiction over employment matters. If an Airport sponsor employment activity is supported by FAA-provided financial assistance or it is alleged that the employment discrimination affects the broader airport program, complaints about that activity must also be reported to FAA.

#### **Discrimination Complaint Referral Procedure**

<u>Internal Complaint Referral</u>. All Title VI complaints must be promptly forwarded to the Coordinator within *two business days*.

<u>Initial FAA Notification</u>. A copy of each Title VI complaint will be forwarded to the FAA within 15 days of initial receipt (not the date that the Coordinator was notified). The Coordinator will forward a copy of the complaint and a statement describing all actions taken to resolve the matter, and the results thereof to the FAA Civil Rights staff. (Note: complaints based on disability do not have to be forwarded to FAA.) To transmit complaint information to the FAA, the Coordinator will upload the complaint and relevant information to the FAA Civil Rights Connect System, which issues automated notifications to FAA staff. The Coordinator will also seek technical assistance from FAA, as needed, throughout complaint intake, investigation and resolution process.

#### **Investigation Procedure**

<u>Assignment of Investigator</u>. The Coordinator will immediately refer the complaint to the Deputy Equal Opportunity Director of the City of Phoenix Equal Opportunity Department (EOD). EOD will immediately designate an investigator and begin the investigation. The Coordinator will provide assistance and information to the EOD for its investigation.

<u>Cooperation with FAA</u>. The Coordinator and/or EOD personnel will promptly investigate all Title VI complaints, including those referred by the FAA for investigation. If the FAA is investigating a complaint against the City of Phoenix Aviation Department, the Coordinator will avoid interfering with the FAA investigation, cooperate with the FAA when needed, and share factual information with the FAA.

<u>Prompt Investigation</u>. The Coordinator will make every effort to complete discrimination complaint investigations within 60 calendar days after the complaint is received. Some investigations may take longer with a justification for the delay and assurance that the investigation is being completed as quickly as possible.

<u>Contact with Complainant.</u> The Coordinator will meet with the complainant to clarify the issues and obtain additional information, and also speak with community members and potential witnesses, as appropriate.

<u>Investigation Report</u>. After completing the investigation, the Coordinator will prepare a written report.

<u>Consultation with Legal Counsel</u>. In each case, the Coordinator will consult with Legal Counsel regarding the investigation and the report. Airport Legal Counsel will ensure that the report is consistent with the DOT and FAA Title VI nondiscrimination requirements.

<u>Prompt Resolution of Disputes</u>. The Coordinator will emphasize voluntary compliance and quickly and fairly resolve disputes with complainants, or with contractors, tenants, or other persons, through mediation.

<u>Forwarding Report and Response to Complainant</u>. At the completion of the investigation, the complainant and respondent will receive a letter of findings and determination of the investigation and any applicable resolution. The letter transmitting the findings and any applicable resolution will state City of Phoenix Aviation Department's conclusion regarding whether unlawful discrimination occurred, and will describe the complainant's appeal rights. A summary of the investigation report, any appeal, or follow-up actions will be sent to the FAA via the FAA Civil Rights Connect System.

<u>Appeal Rights.</u> The complainant must be notified of their right to appeal the findings or determinations, and of the procedures and requirements for an appeal:

- The complainant may appeal in writing to the Phoenix Equal Opportunity Director.
- The written appeal must be received within 21 business days after receipt of the written decision using the appeal form as prescribed by the Equal Opportunity Department. For more information or for a copy of the appeal forms in an alternate format, contact 602-262-7716 or via TTY 7-1-1.
- The written appeal must contain all arguments, evidence, and documents supporting the basis for the appeal.
- The Equal Opportunity Director will issue a final written decision in response to the appeal.

<u>Avoiding Future Discrimination</u>. In addition to taking action with respect to any specific instances of discrimination, the City of Phoenix Aviation Department will identify and implement measures to reduce the chances of similar discrimination in the future.

<u>Intimidation and Retaliation Prohibited</u>. City of Phoenix Aviation Department employees, contractors, and tenants will not intimidate or retaliate against a person who has filed a complaint alleging discrimination.
